 Only two of 12 Canadian rivals won their matches, the Royal Canadian Curling Club of Toronto and an Ontario rink skippped by Perry H. Galtch of Lindsay.  
 The group of 40 Dominion players engaged in a series of 10 test matches of five rinks each for the Strathcona Cup, now held by Scotland.

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### Rev. Dr. G. A. Sisco Addresses Meeting in Ottawa

The challenge to Canadian churches to make it possible for the delegates from impoverished churches in Europe and from those countries whose currencies have been devalued, to attend the Central Committee meeting of the World Council of Churches to be held in Toronto in July was sharply presented by Rev. Dr. Gordon Sisco, of Toronto, at a gathering in St. Luke's parish hall, Ottawa, Monday evening of representatives of the various Protestant churches of Ottawa.

### Pembroke Lumber Kings Now in Third Place

Pembroke Lumber Kings and North Bay Black Hawks engaged in an exciting Hockey League match at Pembroke on Monday evening, with the Lumber Kings winning by a 2-1 score. This moved the Kings into sole possession of third place in League standing. The Duncan twins, Erwin and Edwin, formerly of the Inverness Hockey, helped materially in Pembroke's win.

### HOLD MARRIAGE EDUCATION WEAPON AGAINST DIVORCE

London, Jan. 7. - Britain's social workers and church authorities, rebuking their efforts to stem the postwar flood of divorces, believe marriage education is the best solution.

The problem of a high divorce rate was spotlighted recently in a speech by Prynne Elizabeth.

The Princess said at a Mothers' Union rally: "There will always be unhappy marriages, especially when, as in time of war and when there is a housing shortage, it is so difficult for people to live normal married lives."

"When we see around us the havoc which has been wrought, above all among children, by the breakdown of homes, we can have no doubt that divorce and separation are responsible for some of the darkest evils in our society today."

R. S. W. Pollard, chairman of the Marriage Reform Committee, commented: "Divorce and separation are not in themselves responsible for the evils to which the Princess referred. It is the cause, such as inadequate housing and unstable partners, which lead to the breakup of marriage, and are responsible for some of these bad effects."

Three main organizations in Britain try to cope with unhappy marriages. Largest is the Marriage Guidance Council, which is given a grant of £5,000 (£10,000 a year by the government. Smaller grants are given to the Catholic Advisory Council and the Family Welfare Association.

Though these organizations can do nothing about the housing shortage they are encouraging couples in difficulty to come to them for expert advice. The Marriage Guidance Council also encourages engaged couples to come to its marriage counselling for general marriage "education."

The council was formed 19 years ago by doctors, clergy of all denominations except Catholics and social workers anxious to do something to stem the rising divorce rate.

A. J. Brayshaw, council secretary, said two factors are necessary to bring husband and wife together. They should bring their trouble for expert advice in time and they must have a genuine desire to make their marriage a success.

"Ignorance of sex questions and the social responsibilities of marriage," Mr. Brayshaw said, "are very often the cause of broken lives."

The Marriage Guidance Council attaches great importance to education before marriage is better than any

"cure" afterward.  
 At present the divorce rate is running at more than 40,000 divorces made absolute every year.  
 Next year, the Legal Aid and Advice Act, enabling any one earning up to £18 a week to qualify for free legal aid provided they have "disposable capital" of not more than £200, comes into force.

With the expansion of free legal aid, it is expected that the divorce rate will hit a new level.

### U. S. Aid Aboard Nears \$30 Billion

Washington - United States aid to foreign countries since the war has totalled nearly \$200,000,000,000. A Commerce Department report said that from mid-1945 through last

September the amount was \$20,187,000,000. Figures for the last three months of 1949 are expected later, of about \$30,000,000,000.  
 The total amounts to about \$200 for every person in this country.  
 "Reductions in the outflow are expected as war-torn countries rebuild."

## THE MIXING BOWL

Hiho Home-makers! Centuries ago, the Spanish traders took home from Old Mexico the cocoa bean, which they made into a beverage for special occasions. Back in 1720, a great botanist named Carlos Theodorius, meaning "Food of the gods." Today, people the world over consider cocoa and chocolate staple foods and use both in a great variety of ways.

Chocolate is popular and it is always easy to prepare a cocoa or chocolate food. A cup of cocoa, made nutritiously, encourages the drinking of milk. Furthermore, those who consider the cost of a health-giving drink may be surprised to know that you get 50 large cups to the pound of a good pound of cocoa.

**COCOA SYRUP**  
1 cup sugar; 1 cup cocoa; 1 cup boiling water; 1 cup milk.  
Mix cocoa and sugar well together. Add boiling water, continue stirring. Bring mix to a boil and pour into clean jar and store in electric refrigerator.

**Hot CHOCOLATE**  
Measure 2 tablespoons cocoa, sugar, syrup in a serving cup and fill with hot milk.

**Milked COCOA FUDGING**  
1 cup cocoa; 1 cup cream wheat; 1 cup sugar; 1 quart milk; 1 tsp. vanilla.  
Mix cocoa, cream of wheat and sugar. Bring milk to boiling point. Add dry ingredients and cook 15 minutes, stirring constantly. Flavor with vanilla. Rub jelly moulds with cold water; fill with mixture and chill. Cut with cutters and serve.

**MAPLE BUTTER TARTS**  
1 cup brown sugar; 4 eggs; 1 cup maple syrup; 2 eggs; 1 tsp. vanilla; 1 cup walnuts.  
Cream the butter and shortening together. Add the other ingredients. Mix well and pour by spoonfuls into ungreased paper shells. Bake in electric oven at 400 degrees for about 20 minutes. Makes 12 tarts.

**TROL MUFFINS**  
Make your favorite muffin batter. Fill each mould half full and place a piece of semi-soft chocolate on it and fill with more batter. Then place another piece of chocolate on top. Bake in electric oven at 400 degrees for 30 minutes.

**TARTS A TIP**  
1. Try Cocoa Pastry: add 1 tsp. cocoa for 1 cup pastry flour before you mix in shortening.  
2. Try Chocolate Jelly Tarts: add 1 cup jelly to 1 cup sugar and spread on cake.  
3. Chocolate Filling: Cream 1 cup butter with 4 cups icing sugar and add 2 squares unsweetened chocolate melted in 3 cups strong coffee. Beat well and fold into 1 cup cream which has been whipped stiff. Fill tart or cake layers.  
5. Orange-Chocolate Syrup: Add 1 tsp. grated orange rind to 1 cup orange syrup.
