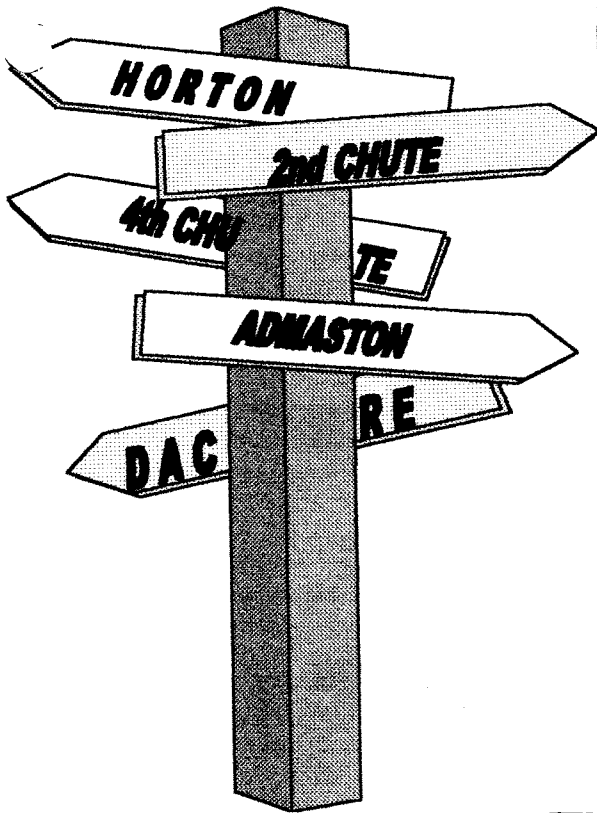

Part 1: What's in a name?

Shakespeare wrote "What's in a name? A rose would smell as sweet by any other." But however true that is, sometimes one can't just leave it at that. There is a certain mystique in wanting to know more about certain things, like how and why place names like *Killaloe* and *Dacre*, and surnames like your own or *Briscoe*, came to be and what they suggest about family and community origins particularly when contradictory theories might abound.

When I was a young child and should have been in bed, I more than once sneaked down the staircase to listen to my parents chatting with visitors in the living room. On one such occasion I heard Dad mention *Killaloe*. I was young enough not to know what "a loe" was or why anyone would even want to "kill" it. Years later a trip to the original *Killaloe* in Ireland gave me a more logical and historically accurate perspective. That's when I learned *kill* is old Irish for *church* and *Lua* was the name of a local Saint. And indeed, the original tiny Church built by St Lua has been dismantled and reconstructed on higher ground outside the later larger 'kill' in Killaloe, Ireland. Some early settlers from the area had no doubt settled in Canada and named our Killaloe after it.

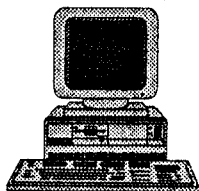
I have long since traced my surname back two millennia and more to pre-Rome days when Aeneas, the Trojan prince fleeing the destruction of his city, landed on the western shore of Italy south of the Tiber and was met by the *Laurenti* who lived in *Laurentum* which got its 'place name' from the *laurus* or laurel trees which grew in abundance there. *Laurenti* eventually became *Lorente* and *Lorenzo* in Latin countries, *Laurent* in France and *Lawrence* in Britain.

Which brings us back to *Dacre*, the *Briscoes* and *Brougham*. The true origin of 'Dacre', the name of a hamlet outside Renfrew, Ontario has long intrigued and eluded me until a few years ago when we rented a car in Liverpool and drove through that part of northern England called Cumbria.

Some Ottawa Valley locals had told me that our word for *Dacre* was likely a corruption of 'God's Acre' - the place, perhaps, where the clergy reserve was located. Others held that a Major O'Dacre who had served in India spent a night in the area and so impressed the locals with his story of the Black Hole of Calcutta (where only 23 of 146 British prisoners were suffocated to death almost a hundred years before) that they named the hamlet after him. Alan Rayburn's first book, Geographical Names of Renfrew County Ontario (1967), says Dacre was called after a place in England. I tend to agree because I've been to where that particular Dacre must be and have seen a remarkable physical resemblance and learned of local connections to our own Dacre.

That *Dacre* has English origins is beyond doubt. There is a *Dacre Lodge* near Enfield, Middlesex, a *Dacre Hill* in Cheshire near Birkenhead, a *Dacre parish* in Yorkshire, a *Dacre stream* in Cumberland, and a *Dacre village* (population 863 in 1975) on the *Dacre River* 4 1/2 miles SW of Penrith and the ruins of *Dacre Castle* are nearby. There are other good reasons for thinking the origin of our Ottawa Valley *Dacre*'s name is strongly tied to Cumberland's *Dacre*.

 The CAL GREEN COLLECTION of negatives, depicting many Renfrew events and family Portraiture, photographed between 1960-and 1978, will soon be available for public viewing.
 Heritage Renfrew's acquisition of a special scanner has enabled it to reproduce Cal Greens negatives into a high resolution digitalized positive image format and in some cases even enhance the image to a much clearer rendition, which was not possible during the earlier days of photography.
 The effort to transform the negatives into positive images began at the beginning of this Dec and to date 150 of the 298 negatives has been reformatted.
 Heritage Renfrew respects the privacy of the many individuals who were the subjects of Greens Photography, and while it welcomes every opportunity to expose this collection to the public, it will ensure that only persons depicted in the photos, or directly related family members of those persons will have access to actual copies of the photos beyond general public viewing.
